30-31 March 2023, Istanbul

The European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, King's College London, and Kadir Has University are co-organising a workshop on the *Economics and Politics of Migration*. To commemorate the centennial of the forced population exchange between Greece and Turkey, this edition will be held in Istanbul at the Kadir Has University's campus on 30-31 March 2023.

The workshop will provide a platform for researchers and policymakers to discuss new research and identify areas for further academic and policy-oriented work. Both theoretical and empirical contributions are welcome. There will be a dedicated discussant for each paper and an open floor discussion.

The workshop features a keynote speech by **Hillel Rapoport (Paris School of Economics)**.

The event will be held in person. There is no registration fee. Accommodation expenses will be covered for speakers and discussants. The organisers are not able to cover travel costs. An invitation-only conference dinner will be hosted on 30 March 2023.
